## HOLIDAY TREE AT THE COMMUNITY CENTER







# **DESIGN FEBRUARY 8 GENERAL MEETING**

There are no design exhibits listed in our handbook for the February 8 meeting, because it was planned as a workshop night. The workshop was changed to February 1 with instruction on Line Design or Mass Line Design. We are hoping participants will bring in something reflecting what they learned at the WORKSHOP to the February meeting. For those that did not attend the workshop you can also bring in a Line Design or Line Mass Design. There will be no Horticulture this month.

**Line Design** -One-dimensional visual path through design. Line direction may be vertical, horizontal, diagonal, or circular. The arrangements are characterized by restraint in the quantity of plant materials used, with an emphasis on the beauty of individual blooms or foliage.



**Line Mass Design** –The dominant line is combined with a mass of plant material at the focal area; additional material is used to enhance and develop the linear shapes.




MARIANNE MUSKUS September 21, 1929 – January 8, 2023
