


ASKED AND ANSWERED


What are some common landscaping mistakes?

1. Volcano mulching

good. You should be able to see the "root flair." Mulching up around the trunk can soften the bark and make it easier for insects and/or disease to get in.



<u>2. Grass height</u> The grass blades should be mowed no shorter than 3 ". The grass blades are what provide nutrients to the plant and the very short grass allows weed seed to germinate more easily.



3. *Plant spacing* Most homeowners or their landscapers plant trees and shrubs too close together and especially too close to the foundation. If a 3-foot evergreen gets 15 feet tall in 10 years you don't want to plant it in front of a window.
