I grew up in Brooklyn, New York in the late 50's and 1960's. It was an interesting time to grow up and Brooklyn was and still is a vibrant, diverse, culturally rich place to grow up in. I lived in a two-family house filled with Italian family members, great food and a fascinating cast of characters who came over to eat the delicious food and share in the laughter and fun we all had in that house on East 52nd Street. The neighborhood I grew up in, was a short car ride to the beach on the Atlantic Ocean. The city (Manhattan) wasn't too far away either, and Brooklyn neighborhoods were and still are great places to explore as

I had one sibling, a brother, Arthur, who was three years younger than me. He was very bright, and he took in all the stimulation in that house and did exceptionally well in school. He became the first doctor in our family who not only was smart, but also very funny. Unfortunately, he died at the young age of 42 from cancer. It was a devastating loss for me. I not only lost my brother but my best friend, and also since he was a psychiatrist, I lost my therapist as well. It took me many years to get over his death and my faith and the faith community I belonged to, was instrumental in helping me cope with the loss.

My parents were fun loving and so I had a happy childhood. We also had fun and entertaining friends and neighbors. Yet I was always a little different. I loved to have fun too, but I was drawn towards the spiritual and religious, as I had a great- grandmother who was very religious, and she influenced me.

I met my husband Anthony, on the block in Marine Park, Brooklyn, where my family moved when I was a teenager. We bought a one family house, as we needed more room, but we always missed the two-family house on East 52nd Street. No house would ever compare with that one. I was married at the young age of 21. I have two sons, one lives here in Newtown with his wife and two children, which is the reason we moved here last year. We help them when needed. My other son hasn't married yet, though he came close a few years ago. But that's another story. He lives in a trendy neighborhood in Brooklyn. I visited him recently and stayed over in his apartment so I could go to the Metropolitan Museum of Art the next day. I love art and museums.

I have always been an educator. I studied early childhood education and psychology in college and taught preschool for many years. Later in life, I studied for a master's degree in Religion and Religious Education and received a degree from Fordham University.

I lived on Long Island with my family for 17 years after moving out of Brooklyn and before moving to Newtown. I never wanted to leave Brooklyn; I loved it there. I loved sitting on my front stoop with neighbors or friends, which has always been a part of Brooklyn life. (Stoop is a Dutch word and stoop sitting began with early Dutch settlers in New York). We moved to Long Island when my children were older, as it was an easier commute for my husband to work. I love books, both fiction and non-fiction. I love flowers, nature, and gardening. I love having a deep faith. I love writing and hope to do more writing in Newtown. Prayer and Scripture study are also a big part of my life.

That's a brief biography. It's not finished, I'm hoping to accomplish much more. But I have to get going, I'm getting older and I'm going to have to stop procrastinating and try to reach my goals.

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Line Mass Design

Line-mass designs combine the strong line of Japanese styles with the massed effect of European designs. Line-mass arrangements have a clean, uncluttered look, with definite line, a well-defined mass, and plenty of open spaces. The dominant line is combined with a mass of plant material at the focal area; additional material is used to enhance and develop the linear shapes. A design combining unusual components and using more plant material than a Line arrangement

Traditional Mass Design

Mass designs are adapted from European designs. They have a thick, full look, with a closed silhouette. Mass design uses more plant material than Line or Line-Mass designs; usually a large amount of plant material is used. The emphasis is on the whole colorful mass of flowers and foliage, rather than on individual components



360 Degree Table Arrangement

A 360 arrangement is one where no matter which way we turn it we can still use it.

FEBRUARY 1 WORKSHOP

The Library is booked for the 2-hour evening workshop (time to be determined) on Feb 1. . Peg Townsend, Margareta Kotch, Barbara O'Connor, and Arline Shanley will teach the class. Four different designs will be demonstrated, and attendees will choose one to try. Line, Line Mass, Traditional Mass and a 360-degree table arrangement will be the designs offered.

Line Design

Line designs are adaptations of Japanese styles. A linear pattern is dominant. Line arrangements are characterized by restraint in the quantity of plant materials used, with an emphasis on the beauty of individual blooms or foliage. Line arrangements are usually bold and dramatic, with importance placed on the contrast of form and texture, with an open silhouette


